# UPDATE OF WORK DAYS AT EAST END GARDENS

March 2nd: At the Magnolia MSC Garden, Christi shared that they had 20 volunteers who assisted in building 3-4 beds, beautifying the garden and planting peach tree saplings. They will have regular Gardening Days on Saturdays and Mondays open to all community members.

March 23rd: At the Black Navarro School Garden, they had about 20 volunteers as well, who helped beautify the garden and planting fruit trees provided by Urban Harvest. They have a vertical aquaponics system that
